Oakwood Beach

The Oakwood Beach project, initial beach fill, has been completed as of May 2015. In an effort to proactively address some of the concerns associated with the project, a community advisory group was established.

The group consisted of one resident from Srape Avenue, Locust Avenue, Bender Drive, South Locust Avenue, Shad Roe Lane, Salem Fort Elfsborg Road, and Mayor Elwell.

The goal of the group was to develop an ordinance that could serve as a starting point for

rules on the new Oakwood Beach. This group also was designed to ensure all residents concerns were heard. The ordinance (2015-3 Utilization of Areas Open to the Public) in its entirety can be found on the municipal website under ordinances.

Some of the highlights of the ordinance include:

-Oakwood Beach Public Access

Points are open 8 am – 6 pm

-Off road vehicles of any type (unless directed by the Township for official business) are prohibited to be operated upon the Properties

-Any refuse generated in connection with the use of the properties must be placed in the proper receptacles where provided for such matters, and where receptacles are not provided, such materials shall be carried away by the person responsible for its presence and properly disposed of elsewhere. Illegal dumping is expressly prohibited.

The committee knows this is a first attempt at reducing potential problems. Questions should be directed to the municipal clerk during business hours.

Cut it and Leave it...

Grass clippings are a major part of New Jersey's municipal solid waste stream. You are already doing your part by recycling. You can do even more by reducing waste at the source. Leave the grass clippings on your lawn when you mow, and let nature do the recycling. Grass clippings provide a natural and healthy fertilizer for a growing lawn. Will thatch be a problem? NO. Thatch is formed from the accumulation of dead roots and stems, not grass clippings. The more you fertilize and water your lawn, the faster it grows and the faster thatch accumulates.

Anti-Idling

New Jersey has had a no-idling regulation for diesel-fueled commercial vehicles since 1972. This law was updated in 2009 to include a provision that states that, with limited exceptions, *no* motor vehicle (diesel or gasoline fueled) may have its engine running if motionless for more than three consecutive minutes. A car is idling when the engine is turned on but the vehicle is not in motion. This practice is not only unnecessary, but also is harmful to the environment and our health.

Heat Exhaustion

With warmer weather beginning to reach the area it is important to protect ourselves from heat related illnesses. Heat exhaustion occurs when a person exercises or works in a hot environment and sweating cannot dissipate the heat generated within the body. Signs and symptoms of heat exhaustion often begin suddenly, sometimes after excessive exercise, heavy perspiration, and inadequate fluid or salt intake. **Signs and symptoms resemble those of shock and may include:** Feeling faint or dizzy, Nausea, Heavy sweating, Rapid, weak heartbeat, Low blood pressure, Cool, moist, pale skin, Low-grade fever, Heat cramps,

If you suspect heat exhaustion:

- *Get the person out of the sun and into a shady or air-conditioned location.
- *Lay the person down and elevate the legs and feet slightly.
- *Loosen or remove the person's clothing.
- *Have the person drink cool water or other nonalcoholic beverage without caffeine.
- *Cool the person by spraying or sponging with cool water and fanning.
- *Monitor the person carefully. Heat exhaustion can quickly become heatstroke.
